In June this year it was a pleasure to accept an invitation to participate as special guest at the IADR Meeting 2010 in Barcelona. This was the first time that an ADEE officer had been officially invited and it was a pleasant opportunity to begin the collaboration with the Education section of IADR.

Dr Paul Boom, President Elect of the Council of European Chief Dental officers (CECDO) accepted an invitation to attend part of the ADEE executive meeting in Amsterdam and in October I was invited to give a short key note talk about the goals and mission of ADEE during the autumn meeting of CECDO in Berlin. This was an excellent opportunity to make the Chief Dental Officers familiar with ADEE and to initiate joint activities in the European community. I believe we are developing a collaborative relationship with other European associations to focus our activities in dental education.

The most memorable event of the year was the celebration of our 35th anniversary in August at the annual meeting held in the unique and beautiful city of Amsterdam. The new dental school and the theme chosen for this years conference were a unified whole. Under the general topic '*Digital Dentistry - A Space Odyssey*' the programme was centred upon the digital support of dental education. Many schools worldwide teach and administer much as they did 30 years ago. This is in contrast with research, where in the laboratory the computer has become a much more advanced tool rather than just a word processor or communication device. In some dental disciplines, the world of imaging and virtual reality has been introduced and there will be many more changes in the near future. Students must become familiar with these advances during their education while the educational process itself can also benefit from these new developments. We experienced exciting memorable days in Amsterdam with excellent lectures and fruitful discussions in the environment of the ADEE family.

On behalf of the ADEE family I would like to acknowledge the great work that Marjoke Vervoorn and her Local Organising Committee put into the planning and preparation of this important event in the calendar of dental educationists across Europe. I also offer sincere thanks to all the speakers

First, the annual meeting in Amsterdam if measured by the number of participants, was very successful. A record number of 367 people attended. The weather did not cooperate but it looked as if delegates did not mind and had a lot of fun.

During the General Assembly Cecilia Christersson from Malmo was elected President Elect. Cecilia will be the second female President of ADEE following Jolán Bánóczy who held office in

1992-93. It is about time we had a Madam President and I hope that many will follow. ADEE have appointed a new Secretary General, Damien Walmsley, a new Treasurer, Argyro Kavadella and two new members Corrado Paganelli and Christoph Ramseier. I wish them all good luck and an interesting and satisfying time on the Executive Committee.

The penetration of EU policy and bureaucracy by ADEE proved to be successful, referenced by an invitation to ADEE from Mr. Jurgen Tiedje, Head of Unit of the Directorate General Internal Market and Services, to join a meeting on the revision of the Professional Qualification Directive. Damien Walmsley has reported on this meeting (see Page 6). For the last two years EU business was taken care of mainly by Fons Plasschaert as EU senior officer and myself as Secretary General. In September Damien Walmsley took over the task from me with Brian Murray as the EU senior officer and secundant. I am fully convinced that ADEE's interest in EU business is in good hands for the coming years and I am grateful to Fons for all the support he gave in this matter.

In Amsterdam a start was made with the EU funded LifeLong Learning project, under the lead of Jonathan Cowpe and Argyro Kavadella. Although I will step down as Secretary General at the end of this year I will stay active representing ADEE in this project and as a consequence will fortunately participate in the annual meetings in Antalya and Lyon. What will happen afterwards, I do not know yet.

In the nine years I served on the Executive Committee the goals set out in the ADEE long-term Business Plan, drafted by Anders Nattestad and I, have all been accomplished. ADEE has many more members, Corporate membership was successfully introduced, an office was established and ADEE was formally located in Dublin, the meetings have grown bigger and the format of the meeting has been revised and more formalized, the budget has been tripled and the reserves have increased significantly, and recently as mentioned above, ADEE is acknowledged by the EU to represent dental education in Europe. ADEE has grown into an adult and healthy organisation and I am grateful to have been part of this process. From here on new plans and new directions have to be developed.

During my years in the Executive I have worked with five Presidents: John Scott, Fons Plasschaert, Heikki Murtooma, Malcolm Jones and Winfried Harzer. I thank them all for their trust, cooperation and warm friendship. I also want to thank the other members of the Executive with whom I worked closely over many years, Anders Nattestad, Damien Walmsley and Argyro Kavadella, and last but not least Majella Giles; she had to cope with all my mails, requests, stupid plans and bad English.

A Report on the 36th ADEE Meeting Amsterdam

The theme chosen for ADEE 2010 was *'Digital Dentistry - a.space.odyssey'*. Meetings and associated activities extended over three and a half days. On 25th August, the International Federation of Dental Educators and Associations (IFDEA) hosted a working breakfast where discussions focussed on the evolving role and focus of IFDEA and the benefits of co-operation with ADEE. One of the take away messages centred on whether it was more appropriate for IFDEA to direct its efforts towards facilitating a network of excellence in dental education, leading to an improvement in communication, from which everything else should follow. This in turn, would encourage all those involved in dental education to share resources. It was agreed that this may be a more productive way forward than attempting to make quality resources available at no cost to dental educators.

An extremely interesting and inspiring day followed. The regular meeting of the Forum of European Heads and Deans of Dental Schools (FEHDD) held. An all-day symposium on issues related to *'Change Management'*, facilitated by Jacques Martinot, the Partner/Director of Krauthammer an international training, consulting and coaching firm. The meeting was interactive, centring on change management and its relationship to a dental school environment, communication and types of reactions to change issues. The day culminated with a series of workshops, implementing practical cases. Once again, this was an important opportunity for Deans worldwide, involved in undergraduate and postgraduate dental education to meet and interact.

During the afternoon an interactive course on the *'use of OSCE's'* along with two Special Interest Groups (SIG), one on the *'Virtual Reality of Dental Education'* and the other on *'Lifelong Learning'*. The latter is the first meeting of this SIG following success in obtaining funding through the European Commission's Lifelong Learning, Erasmus, Multi-lateral Projects funding avenue. Over the next two years the group will address issues surrounding standardisation and harmonisation of CPD delivery to European graduate dentists. The partners include the Universities of Cardiff (lead applicants), Athens, Helsinki, ACTA, Riga and ADEE.

On Thursday 26th August the ADEE meeting began in earnest.

An opening plenary session, with addresses from the ADEE President, Winfried Harzer and the *Rector Magnificus* of ACTA, Professor Lex Bouter was followed by a series of two lectures. Dr Amitai Ziv delivered a talk entitled *'Simulation based Education as a Cultural Chamber Vehicle in Health care Quality and Safety Education'*. He gave a comprehensive overview of simulation, which provides for working within a safe environment and promotes proactive and controlled training. It is trainee-team-system centred where comprehensive feedback and de-briefing allows for lessons to be learned. Ultimately it can be reproducible, standardised and objective. It allows individuals to learn from errors in a safe environment, which can be used to support processes including screening, licensure and certification.

The session was completed by Mr Piet Lammertse, an Aeronautical Engineer by training. He provided an interesting and entertaining history of flight simulation, the move into dental and medical simulation, haptic development and the virtual environment, centering on the development of the *Moog SimoDent Dental Trainer* – *'clearly in digital development, nothing is too difficult for an engineer'*.

The late morning session comprised of poster presentations and dental exhibitions. The latter was provided in the form of short communication rounds within the excellent facilities of the new Dental School at ACTA, with a similar session on the following day. The afternoon session involved Workshops and Special Interest Groups. There were a record number of these, including Workshops on: Professional Behaviour in Dental Education; the Virtual Patient; and Ergonomics More than a Posture. SIG's included: Implants in Dental Education; Staff and Student Exchange; Integration of Biomedical Science in Dentistry; Outreach Dental Training; Assessment and Feedback; Harmonisation of Specialist Training in Europe; Research in Dental Education; African European Co-operation; BDSA-Student Problems; Assessing Competence; and Dental Ethics. The official reception and formal opening of the ADEE Conference hosted by the ACTA Dean, Professor Albert Feilzer were held at the impressive Opera House-Stopera in Amsterdam.

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The 36th ADEE Meeting Amsterdam

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On Friday 27th August, the Plenary Session commenced with a talk by Professor Judith Buchannon, entitled 'Advanced Simulation of What we can Learn from the Path of One Technology'. Issues such as Haptics and second-life virtual world robotics, with the goal of improving student learning showed that simulation provides an opportunity for less time to achieve competency and improve confidence prior to entering the clinic, a useful tool for differentiating between experts and novices and the ability to benefit the most challenged students. It also provides early support for struggling dentists. This was supported through history of the development of virtual reality based technology (*DentSim*). In order for this to progress, there is a need for a dedicated person with strong leadership and realistic expectations, but there are always the challenges of technical and service support, resistance by faculty to move into the future, the cost implications and limitations on the procedures that can be simulated at the present time.

This was followed by a presentation from Professor Wesselink, entitled 'Virtual Reality Development in Dental Education – Focus on Compatibility'. He stressed the values of developing the virtual learning environment and simulation opportunities to support the reality of working within the clinics and the need for greater interaction between the two ways of learning was of paramount importance. Prior to the meeting, a series of six poster presentations had been chosen to be presented verbally and these took place in the morning sessions on Friday 27th and Saturday 28th August.

The early afternoon session was devoted to tours of the new ACTA Dental School, poster presentations and feedback. This year, posters were split into five themes and assessed by five separate teams and there was an average of 20 posters per theme. Themes included learning (digital) environment; clinical dentistry and skills; simulation, haptics and virtual; society and behaviour; and assessment.

Following the General Assembly at the end of the day, delegates were entertained at a celebration dinner in the *Oude Kerk*, one of the oldest Churches in the centre of Amsterdam. It included a sumptuous dinner and excellent post-dinner cabaret!

On the final morning, the first lecture was presented by Professor Kevin Warwick, entitled 'Our Robotic Future'. Delegates received a whirlwind tour of the development of robotics, including brain growing (the level of slugs, bees and wasps) to culture in brain cells direct onto a recording surface. There were a series of video clips involving his own personal experience of chip implants and communication across the internet and the move towards direct neural implants to support those with conditions such as Parkinson's Disease, Epilepsy and Depression. Kevin is believed to be the only man who has ever been 'plugged-in to the internet'.

The final speaker was Marc Prensky, who delivered a talk entitled 'Teaching Digital Natives: Why Games?' He

provided an array of background to gaming, promoting it as a way to improve learning. In so doing, this goes some way towards identifying new approaches to satisfy students' demands and thus engage with students. He stressed the importance for games to have a story, meaningful goals, and promote 'stimulation of a struggle' to attain that goal. He suggested there was an opportunity to introduce gaming concepts into healthcare simulation, supporting a concept of learning with engagement and in so doing promoting the philosophy of gaming into the world of learning opportunities for the healthcare professions.

The session ended with a presentation about the forthcoming 37th Annual Meeting of the ADEE, which will be entitled "Research and its Impact on Dental Education" and will be hosted in Antalya, Turkey, between the 7 and 10 September 2011.

Once again, ADEE surpassed itself with an extremely successful meeting, for which the organising committee and ACTA should be applauded. Whilst the theme was that of digital dentistry, other activities, including poster presentations, Workshops and SIGs demonstrated the wealth of learning, teaching and educational opportunities available to delegates over the period of the conference. Once again, this truly demonstrated ADEE's commitment and involvement in the continuum of education and everything involved in promoting the philosophy of lifelong learning.

Two 'Mature Educator' awards were presented during the recent ADEE Annual Meeting held in the new Dental School building in Amsterdam.

The Excellence in Dental Education award is open to all staff (except Professors) from dental schools that are members of ADEE. Recognition of Excellence is considered in two categories, the 'Early Career' and 'Mature' Educator. Each school may submit two applications in any one year, preferably one Early Career and one Mature Educator.

The criteria for each award are given on the AWARDS page of the ADEE website www.adee.org. It is anticipated that an electronic form will be available to complete submissions for the 2011 awards. Those who are considering an application

for either of these awards should be aware that strength is not required in all areas of the application. The reward for success is, in addition to the receipt of a Certificate, complementary meeting registration and attendance at the congress dinner in year following the award.

Applicants please note that you do not have to be nominated by your Dean, but you do need a letter of support from your Dean. If you are a Dean, then please consider your staff and encourage those whom you believe to be suitable to submit an application.

African-European cooperation

A new Special Interest Group (SIG) on African-European cooperation met during the Amsterdam 2010 ADEE meeting. This topic which was first introduced at a symposium organized during the Helsinki'09 meeting followed on from the first ADEE site visit to an African Dental School - Muhimbili University of Health and Allied Sciences (MUHAS) in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania at the end of 2008. The newly appointed Dean of the MUHAS School of Dentistry, Dr Elifuraha Mumghamba, represented the African Dental Education Association (AfDEA) at the Amsterdam SIG Chaired by ADEE past President Professor Heikki Murtomaa with Dr. Juha Ruotoistenmäki as Rapporteur.

The group in Amsterdam discussed future relevant activities for ADEE. Dr Mumghamba presented an overview of training, research and services which are the main activities of the dental school. It was agreed that these could form frameworks for interaction. He clearly indicated the willingness of the regional schools to participate in this type of activity and raised the initiatives for possible cooperation. Supporting teaching and learning resources in terms of short term teacher exchanges programs, providing educational materials through ICT and joint research projects were discussed as possible means of interaction.

The future cooperation should also include activities among undergraduate dental students which will enhance student collaboration and increase possibilities for exchange opportunities. This reflects positive interest shown by EDSA in this area.

The group will review these initiatives during the year and will present them to the ADEE Executive Committee for further action. This SIG welcomes all ADEE members to participate in further African-European cooperation and invites colleagues to make contact with the SIG so that information on existing activities may be gathered. The group will meet again during at the Annual conference in Antalya, Turkey.

The International Federation of Dental Educators and Associations

IFDEA was established to serve as the representative, independent worldwide voice for dental education by promoting advancement in dental education with the ultimate objective of improving global oral health. It was inaugurated in 1992 at a dental educators' meeting marking the Quatercentenary (400 years) of the University of Dublin, Trinity College. To achieve its mission, IFDEA

worked to serve as a forum for the free interchange of ideas in the field of dental education and research with an international perspective; foster communication among dental educators worldwide; search for improved methods of teaching and learning in health sciences; search for improved methods and strategies for training dental educators; and foster research in health sciences education. In March 2004, IFDEA President Mariano Sanz and IFDEA Executive Director Richard Valachovic conducted a general meeting of IFDEA to consider a new vision for the organisation. The impetus to create a new vision included the following factors:

A New Vision for IFDEA

In 2007, fifteen years after its inaugural meeting, IFDEA returned to Dublin to re-launch the organisation at the conclusion of the Global Congress on Dental Education III. President of Ireland, Mary McAleese, officially launched the International Federation of Dental Educators and Associations: The Global Network for Dental Education. The name change was more than semantic; it reflects IFDEA's new strategy to connect and engage with over 30,000 dental staff at more than 900 dental schools worldwide.

We believe that academic dental institutions have the unique responsibility to educate the world's future oral health providers and to prepare students to meaningfully contribute to improving oral health globally. Through its Global Network for Dental Education, IFDEA will support the international academic dental community, including individuals, institutions, and related organisations, in this important undertaking, by serving as an axis of information, best practices, exchange programmes, news and professional development, and by supporting and contributing to the work of the many regional dental education associations and individual academic dental institutions worldwide.

Sharing knowledge and experience is a two-way process that fosters better understanding and benefits both parties. By sharing knowledge within the global dental education community, we can raise standards and improve oral health worldwide, as well as recognise the valuable innovations to be found in under-resourced regions of the world.

The most recent change to the organisation came in late 2009 when the following IFDEA Board changes were implemented: Anders Nattestad followed Rick Valachovic as

Executive Director; Dr. Valachovic became Secretary of the Board. At the same time the organisation moved base from the offices of ADEA in Washington DC to the University of the Pacific Arthur A. Dugoni School of Dentistry, San Francisco USA. The current IFDEA President is Patrick J. Ferrillo, who also serves as Dean of Pacific Dugoni School of Dentistry.

Prof. Anders Nattestad is Director of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery, Arthur A. Dugoni School of Dentistry San Francisco USA. He is a former ADEE Secretary General and was involved in the DentEd project for 10 years.

Mark Brennan - Obituary



In September we learned with great sadness of the untimely death of Mark Brennan, ethicist and clinical educationalist

Mark held a degree in Religious studies and a Masters in Medical

Ethics and Law. Following a three year appointment at the University of London he spent three years involved in Philosophy research at the University of Kent. He held an appointment as lecturer in Palliative Medicine Education and Ethics for a number of years at the University of Bristol where he was involved in the restructuring of the medical curriculum. During that time he was an advisor to the MDU/DDU where amongst other things he was instrumental in the inauguration of the Teacher of the Year Award.

In 1998 his experience led him to his involvement with dental education in Cardiff where he helped with the development of the dental undergraduate curriculum. Over the years he was drawn towards the international aspects of education. He was an enthusiastic supporter of the DentEd project, undertaking three visitations and contributing to various working groups within DentEd.

Mark organised two European Dental Education Symposia in Cardiff, and was a key member of the Organising Committee for the ADEE meeting in Cardiff in 2004. He regularly attended the ADEE meetings, and in between times, organised several Dental Educator's workshops at the Association for the Study of Medical Education's annual meetings, and was a visiting senior lecturer for both the Dental School in Trinity College and the Royal College of Surgeons in Dublin. Latterly Mark moved back to his beloved Kent as head of the Division of Clinical Education in the Kent Institute of Medicine and Health Sciences where he met his wife Lottie. They were married earlier this year.

Prior to the diagnosis of his illness in August he was actively pursuing a career change back towards becoming a clerk in holy orders. The world has lost an inspirational teacher, he will hold a special place in the hearts of all whose life he touched.

European Professional Qualifications Directives

The 2005 Professional Qualifications Directive (PQD) facilitates free movement of citizens within the European Union. At the invitation of Jürgen Tiedje, Head of Unit, EU Directorate General Internal Market and Services of the EU Damien Walmsley and Brian Murray represented ADEE at a recent meeting in Brussels to evaluate the PQD.

The Director General explained that the 2005 PQD allows free movement within the EU for professionals who have the required qualifications to work in a host country. Surveys have shown that whilst EU citizens expect a quick or automatic recognition of their qualifications, this is often not the case. It is reported that 30% of Citizens encounter major problems; hence the need for an evaluation of the PQD. There have been many meetings regarding PQD with the view of producing a green paper in 2011.

A series of questions have been raised including mobility, education and training. The Director General is particularly keen to explore the introduction of a Professional card or e-certificate that provides a profile of the holders professional qualifications. We are grateful to Hill and Knowlton for

assisting ADEE in formulating a response to this initiative.

As one can imagine it was a busy day and the ADEE team contributed to the lively debate that ensued. ADEE has also been in discussion with the Council of European Chief Dental Officers (CECDO) about this topic with the aim of formulating a joint response to the directive.
